## Former Rectory (now 'Hailie'), 6 Portsmouth Road

## **Listed Grade II**



Some of the materials for this house were recycled from two demolished cottages on the site (see comment on Little Boarhunt Gatehouse panel).

The house was originally called Hailie, until the Rectory—previously at what is now Glebe House in Rectory Lane, Bramshott—was relocated here by Rector Titherington in 1922. The Hailie name was restored when the new Rectory was built behind the Church Centre.

Despite subdivision of the plot when most of the orchard was lost—much of the Triggs-designed garden

House. 1912, by Inigo Triggs. Of strong vernacular appearance, with sandstone rubble lower walls and tile-hung upper walls, with scalloped bands. Tile roof, with gablets above hipped ends, which are brought to a low eaves above outshots, central gable to the projecting two-storeyed porch. porch, the door having panels of lozenge form. Prominent brick stacks with arched panels. The roadside entrance has
