

The Green Dragon Public House, London Road

Listed Grade II

Public house. C18 and C19. Rubble stone walls with stone dressings, painted: plinth. Tile roof, one gabled half-dormer. Two storeys, four windows. Victorian sashes. Plain doorways and carriageway to the rear yard.

Anciently The inn was owned by the little monastery of Shulbrede, in Lynchmere.

(See Roger Newman 'A Hampshire Parish')

A local family, the Denyers, after paying £200 for the property, ran the Dragon for half the 1800's. Beer was brewed on the premises until 1842.

The building was extensively damaged as a result of a fire on 17th January 2013: parts of the roof structure survived and it was subsequently restored One upshot of the fire was that parts of the building were dated back to the 16th century—much earlier than the
